Reading Politics: Ideology and Class



Reading Politics takes up class and ideology as related key concepts for understanding the challenges facing us in creating more just and equitable futures. This course will explore the contemporary uses of these concepts, with an eye to the ways they help us better understand how cultural forms and practices participate in producing and representing class. The course will start at the emergence of the idea of class and ideology in the work of Karl Marx, before delving into the ways Marx's work has been taken up and modified over the course of the 20th century in literary and cultural criticism. Investigating how developments in our understandings of class play out in film and literature, the course will be divided into four sections: Marxist Feminism, Critical Race Theory, Indigenous Politics, and Unemployment. In this course, we will develop a sense of class and ideology as concepts that change over the course of the 19th and 20th centuries, in order to assess how they operate leading into the 21st. Particular attention will be paid to film, contemporary novels, and the rise of online critical journals.

Learning Goals

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify and understand various understandings and uses of ideology and class;
- Demonstrate understanding of the cultural, historical, and political contexts in which ideology subsists;
- Apply techniques of critical analysis as appropriate to literary forms, genres, and media;
- Use literary study to develop skills for careful reading and clear writing;
- Read and discuss literature on the levels of content, form, and politics.
